

# **Epistle**





For I do not want you to be unaware, brethren, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea; <sup>2</sup> and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea; <sup>3</sup> and all ate the same spiritual food; <sup>4</sup> and all

drank the same spiritual drink, for they were drinking from a spiritual Rock which followed them; and the Rock was Christ. <sup>5</sup> Nevertheless, with most of them, God was not well pleased; for they were laid low in the wilderness. <sup>6</sup> Now these things happened as examples for us, that we should not crave evil things, as they also craved. <sup>7</sup> And do not be idolaters, as some of them were; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and stood up to play." <sup>8</sup> Nor let us act immorally, as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in one day. <sup>9</sup> Nor let us try the Lord, as



some of them did, and were destroyed by the serpents. 10 nor grumble, as some of them did, and were destroyed by the Destroyer. 11 Now these things happened to them as an example, and they were written for our instruction, upon whom the end of the ages has come. 12 Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall. 13 No temptation has overtaken you but

such as is common to man; and God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able; but with the temptation will provide the way of escape also, that you may be able to endure it.

Luke 16,1-13

[Now Jesus was also saying to the disciples,] "There was a certain rich man who had a steward, and this steward

was reported to him as squandering his possessions. <sup>2</sup> And he called him and said to him, 'What is this I hear about



you? Give account of your stewardship, for you can no longer be steward.' <sup>3</sup> And the steward said to himself, 'What shall I do, since my master is taking the stewardship away from me? I am not strong enough to dig; I am ashamed to beg. <sup>4</sup> I know what I will do, so that when I am removed from the stewardship, they will receive me into their homes.' <sup>5</sup> And he summoned each one of

his master's debtors, and he began saying to the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' <sup>6</sup> And he said, 'A hundred measures of oil.' And he said to him, 'Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty.' <sup>7</sup> Then he said to another, 'And how much do you owe?' And he said, 'A hundred



measures of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' <sup>8</sup> And his master praised the unrighteous steward because he had acted shrewdly; for the sons of this age are

more shrewd in relation to their own kind than the sons of light. <sup>9</sup> And I say to you, make friends for yourselves by means of the Mammon of unrighteousness; that when it

fails, they may receive you into the eternal dwellings. <sup>10</sup> He who is faithful in a very little thing is faithful also in much;



and he who is unrighteous in a very little thing is unrighteous also in much. <sup>11</sup> If therefore you have not been faithful in the use of unrighteous Mammon, who will entrust the true riches to you? <sup>12</sup> And if you have not been faithful in that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own. <sup>13</sup> No servant can serve two masters; for

St. Dominic, Founder of the Dominican Order (1170 - 6 August 1221). Dominic was the founder of the Order of Friars Preachers (Ordo Praedicatorum = O.P.). He was a native of Calaruega in Old Castile, Spain, probably from the ancient family of the Guzman. He began his studies at Palencia at the

age of 14. During a famine in 1191 he is said to have sold all his possessions, including his books, in order to help the poor. In 1199 he became a canon of Osma, his native diocese,

where Martin de Bazan, Bishop of Osma, had established a strict discipline among his canons, following the rule of St. Augustine. Dominic soon became head of this community, where he remained until, in 1203, he went with Bishop Diego on a preaching tour against the Albigensian heretics in Languedoc St. Dominic as depicted (France). In 1206 they opened an institute for women in danger of the heresy at Prouille, within Albigensian

territory, and attached to it a number of missionary friars. Two years later, after the murder of the Papal legate Peter of Castelnau, Pope Innocent III started a crusade against the Albigensians, and during the seven years of war that ensued, Dominic labored to win the heretics back to the Church, often in danger of his life, but with comparatively little success. When in 1214 the castle of Casseneuil was put at his disposal by Count Simon IV of Montfot, Dominic's plan to found a special order for the conversion of the Albigensians took shape. Several volunteers joined him, and in 1215 these were recognized by the Bishop of Toulouse, and a few months later approved by the pope on condition that they would follow one of the established rules. In 1216 Dominic went to Rome, where he obtained the formal sanction of Pope Honorius III by two bulls granting several privileges to the order.

Dominic's subsequent years were spent in ceaseless journeys all over Italy, to Spain (1218), and to Paris (1219), establishing friaries and organizing the order. In 1220 he attended the first General Chapter at Bologna. A year later he set out to preach against the pagans in Hungary, but fell ill and had to return to Bologna, where he died.

Though the austere Spaniard is a less popular figure than his contemporary, St. Francis of Assisi, he was a man of heroic sanctity, ever zealous to win souls from error by the preaching of pure doctrine. His humility – he refused a bishopric three times – was as great as his courage and his capacity as a ruler and organizer. He is traditionally, but wrongly, held to have instituted the Rosary. Melchior Vulpius, Hymn-Writer and Composer (either ca. 1560 or ca 1570-7 August 1615). Vulpius was probably born at Wasungen in Thuringia and died in Weimar, where he had been the municipal Cantor and teacher at the Latin School. He and his brother Latinized the family name from Fuchs ("Fox") to Vulpius ("Fox"). In his day, he was one of the most important and prolific Lutheran composers of hymn tunes in Germany, having written nearly 200 motets and 400 hymn tunes, not to mention various other works. Tunes of his which

are in The Lutheran 23,140, 208 and

Hymnal are: 19, 547.



## Holy Communion

Concerning Holy Communion, we believe, teach and confess that:

- a. in, with, and under the bread Jesus gives us His <u>true Body;</u>
- b. in, with, and under the wine Jesus gives us His true Blood;
- c. whoever receives Holy Communion, receives it either for salvation or for judgment;
- d. whoever <u>believes</u> the words, "given and shed for you...", receives the Body and Blood of Christ for salvation;
- e. whoever <u>does not believe</u> the words, "given and shed for you...", receives the Body and Blood of Christ to judgment;
- f. out of a pastoral concern for your soul, we ask that visitors speak with the pastor <u>before</u> receiving Holy Communion.

We practice <u>Close Communion</u>. We welcome those to the Lord's Supper who are baptized and confirmed members in good standing of our congregation and sister congregations within the Church of the Lutheran Confession. This reflects the practice of the ancient and apostolic church which opened the Lord's Table only to those who had been baptized and publicly confessed doctrinal agreement with all that Christ had commanded.
