Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 15,12-28

Now if Christ is preached, that He has been raised from the dead, how do some among you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³ But if there is no resurrection of the dead, not even Christ has been raised; ¹⁴ and if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is vain, your faith also is vain. ¹⁵ Moreover we are even found to be false witnesses of God, because we testified against God that He raised Christ, whom He did not raise, if in fact the dead are not raised. ¹⁶ For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised; ¹⁷ and if Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless; you are still in your sins. ¹⁸ Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. ¹⁹ If we have hoped in Christ in this life only, we are of all men most to be pitied.

²⁰ But now Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who are asleep. ²¹ For since by a man came death, by a man also came the resurrection of the dead. ²² For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ all will be made alive. ²³ But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, after that those who are Christ's at His coming, ²⁴ then comes the end, when He hands over the kingdom to the God and Father, when He has abolished all rule and all authority and power. ²⁵ For He must reign until He has put

all His enemies under His feet. ²⁶ The last enemy that will be abolished is death. ²⁷ For He has put all things in subjection under his feet. But when He says, "All things are put in subjection," it is evident that He is excepted who put all things in subjection to Him. ²⁸ When all things are subjected to Him, then the Son Himself also will be subjected to the One who subjected all things to Him, so that God may be all in all.

Marlene Ida (nee Krause) Clappier passed away peacefully at her home on January 3, 2017.

Marlene was born October 15, 1932, in Onalaska, WI, to Harry and Edna (nee Stellner) Krause. She was baptized into the Christian faith on November 13, 1932, by Pastor Walter Paustian, as witnessed by Emma Stellner and Emil Krause. As a teenager she was also later confirmed at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Onalaska, WI.

Marlene attended Sand Lake Grade School and Onalaska High School. Upon graduation, she worked for grocery store owner Rudy Pralle.

In June 1955 she was married at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Onalaska, WI, to Richard Clappier, who was in the Marines. The young couple moved to California, where Richard was stationed.

For much of her adult life Marlene worked for the Bell Telephone Company. She and Richard enjoyed their yacht and fishing.

Survivors include her two brothers, Herbert (Ivadell) Krause of Holmen, WI, and Gordon (Rhoda) Krause of Watertown, SD; her sister, Lois (Richard) Babish of Fountain Valley, CA, as well as other relatives and friends. Her husband Richard preceded her in death in September 2010.

Marlene was living at home at the time of her death.

Reflections – Epiphany – Jan. 8 – Feb. 4, 2017

Georg Stöckhardt, American-German Theologian & Professor (17 February 1842 - 9 January 1913). Stöckhardt



was born in Chemnitz, Germany, and studied theology at the Universities of Erlangen and Leipzig (1862-66). After graduating, he was a private tutor until becoming a Pastor in Planitz, Saxony (1871-3). He became acquainted with the Free Church in Germany and also the Missouri Synod. In 1876, in protest against indifferentism and unscriptural practice in the state church, he and others formed the Evangelical Free Church of Saxony and

Other States; he became it secretary and also editor of the church paper, *Die Evagelisch-Lutherische Freikirche*. For his articles against apostasy in the state church, he was sentenced to four months in prison. In 1878, he emigrated to America and became the pastor of Holy Cross in St. Louis, MO, and also began lecturing at Concordia Seminary. Walther wanted Stöckhardt elected to a professorship at the seminary; the synodical convention elected a young graduate, Franz Pieper. In 1887 Stöckhardt was elected professor. His area of

expertise was exegesis and he wrote commentaries on Romans, Ephesians, 1 Peter, Isaiah 1-12, and Psalms. He also wrote a Bible History. He was a forceful preacher and an orthodox Lutheran. He also wrote various sermon books as well as articles for *Lehre und Wehre* and the *Homiletic Magazine*. Virtually all of his writings were in German. He was a staunch supporter of C. F. W. Walther in the Presdestinarian Controversy and other controversies of the time.

Ernst I "der Bekenner (the Confessor)," Duke of Braunschweig-Lüneburg, Reformer (26 June 1497 - 11



January 1546). Ernst was a nephew of Frederich the Wise, Elector of Saxony and the son of Heinrich I of Lüneburg, who united his principality with Braunschweig. In 1514 he was sent to his mother's brother's Court at Wittenberg and attended university there, coming under the influence of Luther and other reformers. In 1520, on account of administrative incompetence,

Ernst's father was deposed by the emperor, Charles V, and fled to France, and Ernst and his brother, Otto, became corulers; with the retirement of Otto in 1527, Ernst became the sole ruler. Ernest moved slowly to implement the Reformation, but after Roman Catholics tried to reinstate his father in 1527, he became more committed. In July 1527 a Lutheran book of discipline (Church order) was introduced and between 1527 and 1530 Lutheran preachers were introduced in most parishes. In 1530 he signed the Augsburg Confession. During the Smalcald War his territory remained true to the Lutheran faith. He persuaded the northern

German cities of Hamburg, Bremen, Brunswick, Göttingen and others to join the Smalcald League and also mediated disputes within the League in order to keep it together. In 1535 he founded a territorial court of justice based on Roman law and laid the foundation for territorial absolutism. His administrative reforms were bound up with his passion for religious reform. In 1528 in Schwerin, Ernst married Sophia, the daughter of Henry V, Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin and Ursula of Brandenburg; they had eight children who reached adulthood. His sons and grandsons signed the *Book of Concord* (1580). Ernst was a champion of the Lutheran cause.
